2019-20 Academic Year

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What is Wyoming Works?

Wyoming Works is a state program that provides grants for students and funding for community colleges in select technical programs that meet labor and economic development needs.

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Are all Wyoming Works academic programs available at each Wyoming Community College?

No. Each year, each Wyoming Community College chooses a selection of its academic programs to submit to the Wyoming Community College Commission. The Commission determines if each submitted program meets the eligibility requirements necessary to be deemed a Wyoming Works academic program. Approved academic programs are eligible for Wyoming Works student grants at their respective college location. Since each college selects its academic programs to submit, approved Wyoming Works academic programs may differ from college to college.

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Which academic programs are part of Wyoming Works at NWC?

It is important to recognize that the list of NWC approved Wyoming Works academic programs may change each year as the Wyoming Community College Commission evaluates the College's annual academic program submissions. Therefore, Wyoming Works academic programs are subject to change each academic year and there is no guarantee that any specific academic program will remain approved as a Wyoming Works academic program for any subsequent academic year. Additionally, the College may elect to not award Wyoming Works student grants to all of its Wyoming Works approved academic programs. Finally, the classification of each academic program ("critical" with a greater annual Wyoming Works student grant award and "standard" with a smaller annual student grant award) may change from year to year.

Is there a student grant available to assist me with the cost of a Wyoming Works academic program?

There is! NWC has an allocation of funds from the Wyoming Community College Commission that it may award to students as Wyoming Works student grants. Space and grant funding are limited and are offered on a first to apply, first considered basis. Not all applicants will qualify for a Wyoming Works student grant, and not all who qualify may receive an award. The annual amount of a student grant corresponds to the classification of the specific Wyoming Works academic program. Some Wyoming Works academic programs are deemed “standard” and have a maximum annual student grant of \$1,680. Some are deemed “critical” and have a maximum annual student grant of \$3,360. The amount of student grant for which you may qualify will be based on:

1. The classification of the program in which you are enrolled;
2. Your “unmet financial need”, as determined by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA, <https://fafsa.gov>); and
3. The College’s unallocated allocation balance that remains in the academic year in which you are enrolled.

What are the eligibility requirements of the student grant?

For each semester to which a Wyoming Works student grant applies, you must:

1. Demonstrate Wyoming residency as determined by the community college at which the student is enrolled prior to the commencement of the period of enrollment for which the grant is applicable.
2. Be enrolled in a Wyoming Community College Commission approved credential program eligible for Wyoming Works funding (which may be classified as credit or non-credit) and apply for a Wyoming Works student grant prior to beginning that academic program.
3. File, and fully complete, a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA, <https://fafsa.gov>) applicable to each semester in which the approved academic program spans, including complying with all Financial Aid Office directives to provide data, documents, and information necessary to complete any data authenticity review necessary to generate a valid Expected Family Contribution (EFC).
4. Be a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien who meets the definition of an eligible noncitizen under federal Title IV requirements.
5. Be free of default on all federal student aid education loans.
6. Not owe a refund under any federal student aid financial aid programs, and, any student financial aid programs administered through the state of Wyoming.
7. Not currently receive (or expected to receive within the length of the Wyoming Works academic program) a scholarship under the Wyoming Hathaway scholarship program.
8. Maintain continuous enrollment for each semester within your Wyoming Works academic program.
9. Meet all Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements applicable to your Wyoming Works academic program.
10. Not have exceeded receipts of Wyoming Works student grants for more than three (3) academic years.

How do I apply?

To apply for consideration at NWC, do four things:

1. Apply for admission, and enroll in, a Wyoming Works academic program at NWC.
2. Register for required courses/content within that Wyoming Works academic program.
3. Complete an NWC Wyoming Works student grant application before the first semester of your Wyoming Works academic program begins. Apply online at: <https://nwc.edu/financialaid/wyomingworks/apply>.
4. Complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for the academic year in which you plan to be enrolled. When submitting the FAFSA, ensure NWC’s school code is entered (school code: 003931). File the FAFSA online at: <https://fafsa.gov>.

Once these four steps are completed, the Financial Aid Office will be able to begin reviewing your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant at NWC.

If I'm eligible for a student grant, how is my award calculated?

When you file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the US Department of Education calculates something called your Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which is a measurement of your family's financial strength calculated according to a formula established by Federal law. The EFC is then subtracted from your program's Cost of Attendance (COA), the sum cost of tuition, mandatory fees, room and board, books and supplies, and travel & personal expenses associated with your program for the academic year, along with all other grants and scholarships (called "gift aid") you are expected to receive for the academic year. If, after calculation, your COA is greater than your EFC + other grants & scholarships, you are considered to have Unmet Financial Need.

Your Wyoming Works Student Grant will be your Unmet Financial Need, up to the maximum annual Wyoming Works student grant Award (either \$1,680 or \$3,360, depending on which program you have selected and its "standard" or "critical" student grant designation). It is important to recognize that if the maximum annual award for the Wyoming Works academic program must be reduced to meet your Unmet Financial Need, that reduced amount is considered to be your maximum annual student grant amount and you cannot request the difference between your Unmet Financial Need amount and the Wyoming Works academic program classification amount in a subsequent semester during the remainder of the academic year.

For example, say your chosen Wyoming Works academic program had a COA of \$6,000 and is deemed a "critical" program with a maximum WY Works annual student grant of \$3,360, your FAFSA determined calculated your EFC at \$1,200, and you were going to receive another scholarship for \$1,500. Your Wyoming Works student grant calculation would be as follows:

COA	\$6,000
- EFC	-\$1,200
- Scholarship	-\$1,500
Unmet Financial Need	\$3,300

Wyoming Works student grant (for the academic year)	\$3,300
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(in this example, the Unmet Financial Need is less than the maximum annual Wyoming Works grant of \$3,360 for the chosen program. Therefore, the Wyoming Works student grant amount must be reduced to match the Unmet Financial Need amount.)

Once your grant award amount is calculated, it will be divided equally between the fall & spring semesters unless your approved program only spans one semester, in which your student grant would be fully disbursed within that one semester. No note, if your student grant is divided equally between the fall & spring semesters, your full annual student grant would be fully disbursed and you would have no student grant eligibility for a summer semester of enrollment.

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Are there other financial aid options I can explore to help with the cost of my Wyoming Works academic program?

Likely, yes. Many of the Wyoming Works academic programs at NWC are also eligible for institutional scholarships and federal student aid:

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My Wyoming Works academic program will span more than one semester, what must I do to receive the second half of the student grant?

For all Wyoming Works academic programs that span more than one semester, you must:

1. Maintain continuous enrollment for each semester within the student's chosen Wyoming Works academic program.
2. Meet all Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements applicable to the student's chosen Wyoming Works academic program.
3. Not have exceeded receipts of Wyoming Works student grants for more than three (3) academic years.

Additionally, should your next semester of enrollment in a Wyoming Works academic program cross over into the next academic year (academic years run from July 1 – June 30), you will need to:

1. File another Wyoming Works student grant application. <https://nwc.edu/financialaid/wyomingworks/apply>
2. File the applicable Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for that second academic year. <https://fafsa.gov>

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What is Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)?

SAP are qualitative & quantitative evidence or markers, set by the College, that demonstrate you are completing the academic requirements of your Wyoming Works academic program in a timely fashion. Your continued eligibility to receive Wyoming Works student grants rests, in part, with meeting these academic requirements. In other words, SAP are the academic accomplishments you must achieve each semester in order to remain eligible for future disbursements of Wyoming Works student grants. Generally, SAP requirements include Grade Point Averages (semester & cumulative GPAs) in conjunction with "completion pace" requirements (the amount of credits attempted vs completed each semester).

SAP may be different for each Wyoming Works academic program and is calculated at the end of each semester, but generally, all NWC Wyoming Works vprograms that contain courses that are for-credit follow federal student aid regulations when calculating SAP. Federal student aid and Wyoming Works for-credit programs contain five qualitative & quantitative requirements:

<u>SAP Requirement</u>	<u>Type of SAP Measurement</u>
1. Minimum semester GPA of 2.00.	Qualitative
2. Minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00	Qualitative
3. Successfully complete at least 67.00% of all credits attempted during the semester	Quantitative
4. Successfully complete the minimum credits for your semester's enrollment status (full time = 12.0, ¾ time = 9.0, ½ time = 6.0, <½ time = 0.5).	Quantitative
5. Complete the program within 150% of the published program length (ex, a 60.0 credit program x 150% = 90.0 maximum timeframe credits)	Quantitative

If you fail to meet the SAP requirements for your Wyoming Works academic program at the end of any given semester, even those where no Wyoming Works student grant is awarded or disbursed, your eligibility for future Wyoming Works student grants is forfeited.

Do I need to reapply for a Wyoming Works grant each semester?

For each semester, no. Once you have applied for a Wyoming Works student grant for that academic year, the Financial Aid Office will evaluate your initial eligibility and then reevaluate after each semester ends within the academic year to ensure you continue to meet eligibility requirements.

For each academic year, yes. If your Wyoming Works academic program crosses over into the next academic year (academic years run from July 1 – June 30), or if you are returning for your second academic year within your Wyoming Works academic program, you will need to:

- Reapply for the Wyoming Works student grant through the College's online application, found here: <https://nwc.edu/financialaid/wyomingworks/apply>
- File that appropriate year's Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), found here: <https://fafsa.gov>

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How many Wyoming Works student grants can I receive?

If eligible, you may receive up to three (3.0) academic years of Wyoming Works student grants lifetime.

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If I received a Wyoming Works student grant while enrolled in a Wyoming Works academic program at NWC and I have since graduated from that program, can I enroll in another Wyoming Works academic program and get another student grant?

Likely, yes. If you have not received more than three (3.0) academic years' worth of Wyoming Works student grants lifetime, and you meet all other Wyoming Works student grant eligibility requirements, you may be able to receive a Wyoming Works student grant for your second Wyoming Works academic program.

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If I graduated from a Wyoming Works academic program at one Wyoming Community College and received a student grant while in that program, can I transfer to another Wyoming Works academic program at a different Wyoming Community College and get another Wyoming Works student grant?

Likely, yes. If you have not received more than three (3.0) academic years' worth of Wyoming Works student grants lifetime, and you meet all other Wyoming Works student grant eligibility requirements as calculated by the other Wyoming Community College's Financial Aid Office, you may be able to receive a Wyoming Works Student Grant for your second Wyoming Works academic program. To be considered, you must:

1. Enroll in a Wyoming Works academic program at the other Wyoming Community College
2. Complete an application for a Wyoming Works student grant at the other Wyoming Community College
3. Ensure that the other Wyoming Community College will receive your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by adding their specific school code. Contact the other Wyoming Community College's Financial Aid Office for their school code
4. Request an official academic transcript be sent from the Registrar's Office to the Registrar's Office at other Wyoming Community College.
5. Request a summary of your Wyoming Works student grant receipts and eligibility calculations be sent from the Financial Aid Office to the Financial Aid Office at the other Wyoming Community College.

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I am enrolled in a Wyoming Works academic program that is delivered under a Consortium Agreement. What does that mean?

A Consortium Agreement is a written agreement between schools (or a school and an entity that is not a school) to share in the delivery of the Wyoming Works academic program. The written agreement specifies the parts and percentages of the Wyoming Works academic program that each school will contribute.

For example, two schools might enter into a Consortium Agreement to offer a flight program. School A offers all the academic classes (English, Math, other general education courses) and School B offers all the flight related courses. A student under this example's Consortium Agreement would attend School A for all the non-flight related courses, then attend School B to complete the flight related courses. In this hypothetical example, School A and School B work together to deliver the flight program.

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If I am enrolled in a Wyoming Works academic program that is delivered under a Consortium Agreement, can I receive a Wyoming Works student grant?

If eligible, each school will calculate your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant and you must meet all eligibility requirements at both schools. Each school will perform the same award calculation to determine the maximum amount of annual Wyoming Works student grant for which you are eligible, but will only award the percentage of the annual award that corresponds to the percentage of the program it offers under the Consortium Agreement.

For example, using the flight program Consortium Agreement example in the FAQ above, School A offers 70.0% of the program and School B offers 30.0% of the program. Each school will calculate your annual eligibility, but only award their percentage of it. If your maximum annual award was calculated to be \$3,360, School A would award \$2,352 (70%) and School B would award \$1,008 (30%). You would still receive the maximum annual Wyoming Works student grant for which you are eligible, but it will be divided between the two schools delivering your Wyoming Works academic program under a Consortium Agreement.

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I am enrolled in a Wyoming Works academic program but I was told I am ineligible for a student grant. Is there anything I can do?

Possibly. There are certain types of ineligibility determinations that may be appealed to the Financial Aid Office provided you have qualifying extenuating circumstances that affected your ability to meet the specific eligibility requirement and are able to provide documentation to substantiate those circumstances. They are:

1. Not applying for grant funding at the time of applying for admission or before the commencement of the applicable credential program;
2. Not maintaining continuous enrollment in approved program;
3. Not meeting Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements as required for the credential;
4. Not meeting Wyoming residence requirements.
5. Not being in good standing on repayment of student financial aid.

You must submit a written appeal to the NWC Financial Aid Office using the NWC Wyoming Works Appeal Petition form (found at nwc.edu/faforms). Follow all the directions on the Appeal Petition form for appeal consideration.

- For item #1, you may appeal this determination of ineligibility providing you began your first semester of enrollment in your NWC Wyoming Works academic program on, or after, 8/21/19, have extenuating circumstances to explain why you were unable to apply for a student grant prior to the commencement of your program, and meet all other student eligibility requirements.
- For items #2 & 3, you may appeal these determinations of ineligibility on the basis of valid extenuating circumstances in accordance with federal student aid regulations. The Financial Aid Office follows federal student aid regulations when assessing a Wyoming Works student grant continuous enrollment or SAP appeal:

Federal regulations define valid extenuating circumstances eligible for appeal as “[a student’s] injury or illness, the death of a relative, or other special circumstances.” (*2019-20 Federal Student Aid Handbook, Volume 1, Chapter 1, Page 1-15*).

Extenuating circumstances that were generally beyond their control (such as injury or illness, the death of a relative, or other special circumstances) are generally considered to be valid extenuating circumstances that allow an appeal to be approved. Extenuating circumstances that were caused by the student or that the student could have avoided or prevented, or that did not occur within the semester where student grant eligibility was forfeited, are considered invalid and are not eligible for appeal consideration. Appeals will be automatically denied if the appeal is based solely on invalid extenuating circumstances as defined above.

Additionally, in select Wyoming Works academic programs at NWC a student who fails to meet SAP requirements may rehabilitate their student grant eligibility through defined and demonstrated academic performance in lieu of an appeal. See the next FAQ question below to see if your Wyoming Works academic program qualifies for this option. However, if you did not

begin your first semester of enrollment in your Wyoming Works academic program on, or after, 8/21/19, you are ineligible to restore your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant in any Wyoming Works academic program at NWC.

- For **item #4**, you may appeal this determination of ineligibility in accordance with the Residency Classification requirements as outlined on the College's website: <https://nwc.edu/registrar/info/residency.html>
- For **Item #5**, ineligibility due to default on federal student loans or overpayments/refunds of federal student aid you owe to the college or the US Department of Education are not appealable at NWC. You may appeal a Wyoming student financial aid program loan default, overpayment, or refund you owe to the state of Wyoming if you can provide state-issued, Wyoming designated financial institution-issued, or college-issued (where applicable) documentation of an agreed upon resolution to the Wyoming student financial aid debt that is in arrears.

For all other ineligibility determinations, an appeal is not permissible.

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I am ineligible for a Wyoming Works Student Grant due to failing to meet Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) requirements and I do not have grounds for an appeal (or my appeal was denied). Is there anything I can do?

Possibly. At NWC, select Wyoming Works academic programs allow you to “self-rehabilitate” your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant after failing to meet SAP requirements. For these programs, it may be possible for you to complete specific academic accomplishments during your next semester of enrollment in a Wyoming Works academic program in order to restore your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant during the subsequent semester of enrollment or academic year (whichever comes first). For example, if you did not meet SAP after your 1st semester of enrollment in a Wyoming Works academic program and that program offers the option to self-rehabilitate Wyoming Works student grant eligibility, you must meet specific academic requirements during your 2nd semester of enrollment to restore your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant during your 3rd semester of enrollment.

However, if you did not begin your first semester of enrollment in your Wyoming Works academic program on, or after, 8/21/19, you are ineligible to restore your eligibility for a Wyoming Works student grant in any Wyoming Works academic program at NWC.

Finally, not all Wyoming Works academic programs allow you to restore eligibility, largely because there is not a 3rd semester of enrollment within that specific program. So, if a Wyoming Works academic program prohibits self-rehabilitation below, you fail to meet SAP requirements and an appeal is not an option (or your appeal has been denied), you have permanently forfeited your eligibility for Wyoming Works student grants at NWC.
